
Established in New Mexico in 1978, the Child Support Enforcement Program is a federal-state partnership derived from Title IV-D of the Social Security Act of 1975. CSED provides assistance in establishing and enforcing child support obligations (both financial and medical) for families. The mission of CSED is to encourage parents to assume responsibility for improving the economic and social well-being, health, and stability of their children. This is done by locating absent parents, establishing paternity, establishing and modifying child support obligations in court orders, and monitoring and enforcing those obligations.
