NEW MEXICO MEDICAID PROGRAM -CENTENNIAL CARE 2.0

Centennial Care entered its sixth year in 2019 with a transition from Centennial Care 1.0 to Centennial Care 2.0 and has effectuated a modernized healthcare delivery system in New Mexico that focuses on improved access to care, integrated care, care coordination, and quality of services using its four guiding principles:

- To create a comprehensive service delivery system that provides the full array of benefits and services.
- To encourage personal responsibility, so that members become more active participants in their health and more efficient users of the health care system;
- To advance Payment Reform strategies that reward improved outcomes rather than for the quantity of services delivered.
- To simplify the administration of the program for providers and members.

Managed Care Organizations (MCOs)

HSD conducted a procurement resulting in the selection of the following MCOs to provide services to Medicaid members beginning January 1, 2019:

- Blue Cross/Blue Shield of New Mexico
- Presbyterian Health Plan
- Western Sky Community Care

Waiver Renewal

HSD identified opportunities for targeted improvements and modifications that will continue to advance the original principles of Centennial Care through its next iteration. The following changes have been approved by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS):

- 1. Increase annual limit for Community Benefit Respite for people with long term care needs from 100 to 300 hours;
- 2. Continuous Nursing Facility Level of Care for some Community Benefit eligible members;
- 3. Nutritional Counseling added to Agency-Based Community Benefit (ABCB);
- 4. Start-up goods, up to \$2,000 for new Self-Directed Community Benefit (SDCB) members;
- 5. Annual limits on certain SDCB services for new members entering SDCB on or after 1/1/19 (existing SDCB members are grandfathered);
- 6. SDCB Non-Medical Transportation reimbursement limited to mileage and bus/taxi passes;

- 7. Expanded models for care coordination, including for justice-involved individuals;
- 8. Implementation of Home Visiting pilot in counties (Bernalillo, Curry, and Roosevelt) that focuses on pre-natal, post-partum and early childhood development;
- Expanded Behavioral Health Services (Pre-Tenancy and Tenancy Support Services for members with Serious Mental Illness (SMI) – effective 7/1/19; Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT); Adult Residential Treatment Centers for members with Substance Use Disorders (SUD); and Expanded inpatient SUD services);
- 10. Limit Family Planning Category to members through age 50 who do not have other full coverage (Individuals under age 65 who only have Medicare can continue to receive Family Planning Coverage).


Native American Collaboration

The State-Tribal Collaboration Act codified an effective government-togovernment communication and collaboration between state and Tribal governments. The Act provides the framework for the state and Tribes to work together to develop successful programs and services to benefit New Mexico's Native American citizens. Part of the Act requires HSD to train state employees in cultural competency and to submit an annual report to the Governor's office on the agency's implementation of the Act, as well as the programs and services HSD provides for Native Americans.

The Native American Technical Advisory Committee (NATAC) was established in September 2012 as a subcommittee of the Medicaid Advisory Committee to give the Tribes, Pueblos, and Nations an opportunity to meet with the New Mexico Medicaid Director on a quarterly basis. The focus of these meetings is to continue discussion regarding Medicaid, including Centennial Care 2.0, the 1115 Waiver Renewal negotiations with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), and to continue discussions regarding implementation of the CMS guidance regarding services "received through an IHS facility".

HSD continues to work with IHS/Tribal 638 facilities to develop the process for 100% Federal Medical Assistance Percentages (FMAP) for services received through an IHS/Tribal 638 facility and furnished to Medicaid eligible Native Americans. Efforts include signed Care Coordination Agreements (CCA) between:

- UNMH and Albuquerque Area Indian Health Service (AAIHS).
- Presbyterian Health Services and AAIHS.
- UNMH and Navajo Area Indian Health Service.




Ratio of Federal Dollars to State Dollars for Traditional Medicaid in Fiscal Year (FY) 2021

Ratio of Federal Dollars to State Dollars for Medicaid Expansion in FY 2021









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





Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Enrollment as a Percentage of Population by County as of October 2019






Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program Enrollment as a Percentage of Population by County for October 2018 to September 2019












