This Data Book is the second edition published by the Human Services Department (HSD). Our department's mission is:

To transform lives. Working with our partners, we design and deliver innovative, high quality health and human services that improve security and promote independence for New Mexicans in their communities.

Although we are not physically present with members of our community due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we strive to find innovative ways to deliver our benefits and services to our customers and to connect with the communities we serve. Through a variety of programs described herein, we are deeply honored to serve more than half of all New Mexicans.

The 2021 Data Book is designed to provide you with national data that compares New Mexico to other states. Further, it also provides county-level information that is already used by HSD and can be used by you to identify our state's areas of greatest need and to develop policy solutions that address these needs. This year, in line with our broader vision of interagency collaboration, we have included data not only from HSD but also from sister health agencies, such as the Aging and Long-Term Services Department (ALTSD) and the Children, Youth and Families Department (CYFD). The 2021 Data Book is intended to help you easily identify "hot spots" needs in our state using data, which is important for evidence-based policy making. The Pew Foundation has published extensive data on evidence-based policy making, outlining five key components that each require evidence. In addition to the Data Book, HSD launched a Departmental Performance Scorecard, available publicly online as of October 2020, which supports the Department in all five areas outlined by Pew: program assessment, budget development, implementation oversight, outcome monitoring, and targeted evaluation. At HSD we place a very high priority on using data to identify key priorities, track our progress, and prove the effectiveness of the investments that the Legislature makes in our Department and its programs every year.

The 2021 Data Book and the new Departmental Performance Scorecard are part of HSD's broader strategy for business transformation and for being trusted fiduciaries of tax payer dollars, striving to leverage federal funding where appropriate to transform lives. The COVID-19 pandemic has provided HSD with an unexpected opportunity to dramatically modify our business model. Specifically, HSD has 1,665 employees, of which 90% were rapidly moved to working from home and office hours in over 40 offices were reduced by at least 75% to reduce potential transmission of COVID-19. This move resulted in significant increases in employee productivity and both customer and employee satisfaction. This is a model we want to sustain going forward, and while there may be some minimal return to an office-based environment, we plan to preserve the home-based call center model and work-at-home efficiencies we have captured.

We thank you for your confidence in HSD and hope that you will find the 2021 Data Book contains an abundance of information that can be used to drive evidencebased policy and legislation to positively transform the lives of New Mexicans.

#### FISCAL YEAR 2022 BUDGET REQUEST FACTSHEETS

Each fact sheet highlights one of 11 significant budget requests in a clear and concise format by summarizing the request, proposed funding, and benefits to New Mexico. The Fiscal Year (FY) 2022 HSD budget request is \$7.782 billion, with a 15.72 percent (\$1.225 billion) request from the state general fund. Nearly 85 percent of HSD's budget is funded by federal matching funds from a variety of programs. For every additional dollar of new general fund, HSD will earn ~\$2.52 in additional federal funds. Over the last several years, HSD has managed its programs with little to no new general fund appropriations. The fiscal year 2022 request reflects the administration's efforts to invest in these critical and important programs.

## 2020 AGENCY HIGHLIGHTS

## SECTION 1B

Highlight significant efforts of Human Services Department (HSD), Aging and Long Term Services Department (ALTSD), and Children, Youth, and Families Department (CYFD) from 2020 including efforts to support New Mexicans during the COVID-19 pandemic.

### New Mexico Human Services Department (HSD) 2020 Highlights

#### **Office of the Secretary**

Ms. Shelly Begay was hired for the **Native American Liaison** position. The Liaison serves as key staff on state-tribal issues for the Department and assists in formalizing the Department's government-to-government relations. She works in partnership with the Native American Liaisons in the other Health and Human Services Departments and with the Indian Affairs Department. Ms. Begay leads the Department's efforts to achieve the goals and objectives of HSD's Native American Initiative by working with all HSD Division staff to address Native American issues across multiple state and federal program areas. Through outreach and communication regarding HSD programs and services, she addresses tribal concerns and gathers input on developing solutions.

#### **Behavioral Health Services**

BHSD is the **Single State Authority for Mental Health and Substance Use Treatment**. The division oversees behavioral health statewide and works with providers to improve access to critical services. BHSD funds non-Medicaid services through a combination of federal and state dollars. BHSD obtained **COVID-19 federal emergency grants** to provide crisis mental health services, including certified peer support counselors for the homeless population impacted by the pandemic, and to expand NM Crisis and Access Line services with a line dedicated to health care workers and first responders. BHSD also received a **grant from the Department of Justice** to fund Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion (LEAD) programs. BHSD authorized **telehealth** and telephonic delivery of most behavioral health services, and conducted COVID-specific outreach to Native American communities including a COVID 19 coloring book promoting safety precautions.

#### **Child Support Enforcement**

CSED has created a new case management structure based on national best practices which led to the division attaining **83.2% of IV-D (Title IV-D of the Social Security Act) cases having a support order**, which is the 2nd highest performance in the program's history. **CSED collected a record amount in child support in SFY20 at \$156M**. CSED expanded its new approach to case management through a Case Prioritization Tool (CPT) which uses data to drive actions and implemented a new structure for performance improvement (using Lean Six-Sigma and Organizational Change Management (OCM)). CSED also created the STEP-up program in partnership with the NM Department of Workforce Solutions, which focuses on improving child support payor employability and on the employment search. CSED has experienced a sharp turnaround over the previous two fiscal years, which was achieved through reduced attrition, reduced vacancies, and its new performance management structure.

#### **Departmental Performance Scorecard**

The Scorecard (section 7 of the Data Book), launched in Oct 2020, is a strategic management tool used to identify and improve various internal business functions and their resulting outcomes, and provide feedback to key stakeholders, including HSD customers and the public. It is designed to help answer the most common questions New Mexicans may have about HSD. The HSD Performance Scorecard is designed to:

- Promote greater intra-departmental communication and accountability;
- Maintain strategic focus;
- Determine what is critical to measure;
- Implement changes and measure outcomes; and,
- Tell HSD's story accurately, consistently.

#### Income Support

The SNAP caseload has increased due to the pandemic and the Department received a waiver to **provide the maximum benefit to everyone enrolled in the program** for the last 4 months of the fiscal year. HSD also received approval to implement the **P-EBT SNAP program** which allowed ISD to issue SNAP benefits to students enrolled in the Free and Reduced School Lunch Program.

#### Medical Assistance Division (Medicaid)

MAD administers Medicaid/CHIP healthcare programs through Centennial Care Managed Care and fee-for-service (FFS). Program administrators oversee the eligibility, enrollment and funding of Medicaid/CHIP enrollees and the enrollment and funding of healthcare providers, including hospitals, nursing facilities, physicians and dentists, and behavioral healthcare providers and agencies. As of October 2020 (September projection) **Centennial Care covers 896,256 individuals, of which 806,837 receive full benefits (comprehensive coverage), and 89,419 receive partial benefit coverage**. Since the Public Health Emergency, MAD has received supplemental federal funds under the **Families First Coronavirus Response Act**. These funds have been put to use by expanding healthcare coverage to newly eligible enrollees, adjusting fees and expediting payments to healthcare providers, and expanding Network and out-of-Network services; notably, telehealth and COVID-19 testing and treatment.

#### **Technological Improvement Efforts**

In response to the COVID pandemic, the Department has **deployed technology and equipment to allow staff to telework and made modifications to our major IT systems** (ASPEN and OMNICAID) to implement necessary system changes to respond to the pandemic. This administration is committed to investing in technology to achieve better interaction for our clients and staff.

## New Mexico Aging and Long-Term Services Department (ALTSD) 2020 Highlights

#### Aging Network COVID-19 Pandemic Response & Statewide Improvements COVID-19 Pandemic Response

- Aging Network immediately adapted services to the COVID-19 pandemic. Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs), Aging and Long-Term Services Department (ALTSD) and local providers worked together to transition to all "grab-and-go" or home delivered meals. These entities saw an almost 30% increase in new seniors accessing meals.
- The Office of Indian and Elder Affairs had a similar strategy to approaching modification of service delivery for tribal elders. Specifically, NM Tribes, Nations, and Pueblos experienced a significant increase in need for food, and the ALTSD increased meal delivery by more than 200%.

#### **Statewide Improvements**

- Hybrid model for senior centers with both in-person and virtual service options.
- Sites will continue to provide grab-and-go and home delivered meals.
- Modernizing activities and services to combat isolation.
- Adult day services and in-home services (homemaker and caregiver respite) remain-a priority.
- Reimbursement contractual agreements with AAAs and local providers.
- Implementation of SAMScan for the Aging Network and tribes and pueblos, which allows for simplified electronic tracking of meals and other services provided throughout the aging network.

#### Adult Protective Services COVID-19 Pandemic Response & Statewide Improvements COVID-19 Pandemic Response

- Conducting phone, video conference, and socially distanced investigations.
- Modified home and attendant care services.
- Developed a testing procedure that allows Investigative Case Workers to make more face-to-face contact while ensuring client and worker safety.
- Added APS to HSD agreement for Medicaid reimbursement.

#### **Statewide Improvements**

- Adapting services to meet the current needs resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Revising the Critical Incident Report process.
- Working with NM Department of Health (DOH) and Long-Term Care Ombudsman on well-being and safety of residents.

#### <u>Consumer and Elder Rights COVID-19 Pandemic Response & Statewide Improvements</u> COVID-19 Pandemic Response

- Significant increase in calls to the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC). ADRC usually receives ~2,000 calls a year. By the end of September 2020, ADRC received 8,000+ calls related to Medicaid open enrollment as well as 700+ COVID-19 related calls.
- Care Transition Bureau also saw a large increase in need related to the transition of seniors from nursing homes back into their communities, seeing a rise in transition advocacy support, Medicaid outreach and counseling, as well as direct assistance and referral from facilities.

#### **Statewide Improvements**

- Telephonic, virtual, and on-demand counseling and services.
- YesNM integration, an online portal that allows the ADRC to link directly with HSD for Medicaid and other benefits.
- ALTSD OnDemand which allows real time access to information relating to benefits and services that ALTSD offers, including referrals to other state health and human service agencies.
- Implementation of virtual presentations and training.
- Increase advertisement and outreach through community partners to reach rural populations.
- Engaging volunteers in modernizing intakes and benefit services.
- Reverse mortgage counseling.

#### Long-Term Care COVID-19 Pandemic Response

- Coordinating response in conjunction DOH for all state licensed assisted living facilities and nursing homes.
- Developed policies and procedures around testing and visitation process.

## New Mexico Children, Youth and Families Department (CYFD) 2020 Highlights

#### Adaptive Response to COVID-19

In response to the pandemic, CYFD collaborated with HSD and DOH to meet new needs. CYFD assumed **leadership of ESF-6 food and shelter emergency response**, delivering more than two million meals, providing more than 30,000 nights of shelter for COVID-impacted individuals and first responders, and staffing a 24-hour call center with more than 30 volunteers. This included putting site coordinators in all major state-operated COVID shelter locations to work closely with local emergency managers, medical staff, and community partners and supporting Community Based Mental Health Clinicians (CBHCs) who coordinate well-being checks, assist with discharge planning, and connect individuals to support in their communities

CYFD also adapted quickly to sustain delivery of services. Within approximately 30 days of the outbreak, the Department's IT team **enabled nearly the entire staff to work remotely** from the safety of their homes and increase their presence in the community of front-line workers to ensure children are safe and families have what they need. Virtual training for new employees was created within two weeks and is now offered monthly. In the face of unanticipated challenges, CYFD continued to improve in four strategic areas: more appropriate placement of youth with emphasis on kinship care; prevention of institutionalization, homelessness, and trauma; optimization of data, accountability, and funding; and sustaining a high-quality staff through reduction of vacancy rates, increased training/support, and robust workforce development.

#### **Behavioral Health**

The Department's Behavioral Health Division coordinates COVID testing, provides technical support, and ensures delivery of PPE to ensure its facilities continue to be safe places for those in need. While accounting for the unique challenges of the pandemic, CYFD continues to rebuild **community-based mental health services throughout the state with an emphasis on a trauma** responsive approach that starts with "What happened and how can we help?" rather than, "What's wrong?"

The Department is steadily rebuilding community-based mental health services throughout the state and has increased the number of providers in Infant Mental Health, Family Peer Support, Multi-Systemic Therapy, and Wraparound services by as much as 50% or more. Many services are available by telephone and a 24-hour Crisis Access Line is now open for assistance with crisis

and non-crisis situations and referrals. Designed to meet the unique needs of individuals and ensure the well being of people of all ages, this ongoing effort benefits homeless youth, victims of domestic violence, those in need of residential treatment, and more.

#### **Protective Services**

In the area of Protective Services, CYFD has made it a priority to place children in care with relatives, decrease the number of out-of-state placements, and greatly reduce its backlog of investigations open longer than 45 days. The **number of children placed with relatives is on a steady upward climb to 35% or higher** while the number of youth placed out-of-state just under 200 at the start of the 2020 to approximately 125 at the end of the third quarter. Meanwhile, through collaboration across the state and a uniform method of tracking cases, the number of past-due investigations in Bernalillo County alone has been reduced from more than 3,400 in January of 2019, to less than 200 now – the lowest in Department history.

While taking these great strides, CYFD also increased worker-child visits for children in foster care to as much as 297% of the required monthly number and thoroughly screened more than 30,000 case referrals to verify instances of abuse or neglect and take appropriate action to provide a safe environment for kids at risk. The Department facilitated delivery of additional funding to foster children and families in need during the current pandemic and economic downturn. Finally, CYFD launched the Extended Foster Care (EFC) program for youth who age out of care and ensured that 100% of youth (currently 85) in EFC have stable housing and are connected with behavioral health services.

#### **Juvenile Justice Services**

In response to the pandemic, CYFD increased health protections, cleaning, and established screening protocols that led to **zero COVID-19 positive cases among youth in its facilities**. The Department took the lead in partnering with the Public Education Department to help find and support youth who are disconnected and/or unaccounted for in schools amidst the pandemic. Additionally, due to heightened risk of suicide and overdose during times of increased isolation and stress, the Department **trained 227 field staff members in the use of Narcan** for prevention of overdose death.

As part of a shift in focus from detention to improved treatment and services, CYFD is drawing upon predictive analytics to identify at-risk families with no record of juvenile justice involvement and proactively reaching out to provide support. With an eye toward the future, CYFD also is exploring the conversion of secure facilities to therapeutic Medicaid placements, working to ensure youth in out-of-home placement have access to appropriate services, and striving to integrate community behavioral health services into solution-driven processes.




### U.S. Resident Population by State as of 2019




### New Mexico Population by Age and Gender as a Percent of Total Population as of 2019



## New Mexico Children (Under 5 Years) Resident Population by County as of 2019



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

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
## New Mexico Minors (Under 18 Years) Resident Population by County as of 2019

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

New Mexico Number of Native American Elders (50+ Years) by Tribe, Nation and Pueblo as Percentage of Total Population, 2017-2020







## Percent Elderly (65+ Years) Resident Population by County as of 2019








## New Mexico Projected Percent Elderly (65+ Years) Resident Population by County, 2030








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## New Mexico Veteran Population as Percentage of Total Population by County as of 2018







#### New Mexico Native American Resident Population by County as of 2019






#### U.S. Per Capita Personal Income by State as of 2019





#### New Mexico Per Capita Personal Income by County as of 2019










#### U.S. Single Parent Households with Children as a Percentage of Households with Children by State as of 2018






#### New Mexico Multigenerational Households as a Percentage of Family Households by County, 2009-2011

#### New Mexico Percentage of Children Raised by Grandparents, 2011-2015




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
#### U.S. Households with Grandchildren and Grandparents as a Percentage of Households with Children as of 2019

## New Mexico Households with Grandchildren and Grandparents as a Percentage of Households with Children as of 2019







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
#### U.S. Unemployment Rate by State as of October 2020






#### New Mexico Number of Medicaid/Medicare Dual Eligible Adults by County as of October 2019




#### U.S. Poverty Rate by State as of 2019






#### New Mexico Poverty Rate of Children (Under 5 Years) by County as of 2019








#### U.S. Poverty Rate Minors (Under 18 Years) by State as of 2019


#### New Mexico Poverty Rate of Minors (Under 18 Years) by County as of 2019








#### U.S. Poverty Rate Adults (18+ Years) with Disabilities by State as of 2019


#### New Mexico Poverty Rate Adults (18+ Years) with Disabilities by County as of 2019








#### U.S. Percent Adults (18+ Years) with Disabilities by State as of 2019


#### New Mexico Percent Adults (18+ Years) with Disabilities by County as of 2019








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
#### U.S. Food Insecurity Rate of Children by State as of 2018

#### New Mexico Food Insecurity Rate of Children by County as of 2018







### New Mexico Behavioral Health Visits for Anxiety, Depression and Trauma per 1,000 Population, January -December 2020



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
#### New Mexico Unintentional Injury Deaths per 100,000 Population by County, 2013-2017








#### New Mexico Suicide Deaths by County per 100,000 Population, 2013-2017











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
#### New Mexico Alzheimer's Disease Deaths per 100,000 by County Age-Adjusted per 100,000 Population as of 2019

#### New Mexico Psychiatrists Full-Time Equivalent Count by County per 10,000 Population as of 2018






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
#### New Mexico Primary Care Physicians Full-Time Equivalent Count by County per 10,000 Population as of 2018

#### New Mexico Core Mental Health Professionals Full-Time Equivalent Count by County as of 2018




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#### New Mexico Prescribing Psychologists by County as of 2018




#### U.S. Number of ICU Beds by State per 10,000 Population as of 2018


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#### Number of General Beds by State per 10,000 Population as of 2018





#### New Mexico Medicaid Program – Overview of Centennial Care 2.0 Programs

Centennial Care entered its seventh year in 2020 and has effectuated a modernized healthcare delivery system in New Mexico that focuses on improved access to care, integrated care, care coordination, and quality of service using its four guiding principles:

- To create a comprehensive service delivery system that provides the full array of benefits and services.
- To encourage personal responsibility, so that members become more active participants in their health and more efficient users of the health care system.
- To advance Payment Reform strategies that reward improved outcomes rather than for the quantity of services delivered.
- To simplify the administration of the program for providers and members.

**Managed Care Organizations (MCOs):** Blue Cross/Blue Shield of New Mexico, Presbyterian Health Plan, Western Sky Community Care

**Public Health Emergency (PHE) regarding Coronavirus (COVID-19)**: On January 31, 2020, the Health and Human Services Secretary Alex M. Azar II declared a public health emergency for the United States to aid the nation's healthcare community in responding to the 2019 novel coronavirus also known as COVID-19. This declaration is retroactive to January 27, 2020. In response to the PHE, HSD requested several federal authorities and were approved for the following:

*New Mexico Disaster Relief State Plan Amendments (SPAs)*: HSD submitted six Disaster Relief SPAs and received CMS approval for the following:

- Expands the list of qualified entities allowed to do Presumptive Eligibility
- Increases DRG rates for ICU inpatient hospital stays by 50% and all other inpatient hospital stays by 12.4%;
- Established Category of Eligibility (COE) for the COVID Testing Group for the uninsured population;
- Targeted Access UPL Supplemental Payments;
- Nursing Facility Rate Increases applied when treating fee for service COVID-19 members;
- Increased hospital stays services from April 1, 2020 June 30, 2020;

- Increased rate increase for services provided under Family Infant Toddler (FIT) program for July 1, 2020 – July 31, 2020;
- A rate increase of \$1 to curbside medication pick-up for all Medicaid pharmacy providers for October 1, 2020 through December 31, 2020; and
- Increased rates to non-hospital providers for E&M, non-E&M, and dental services.

**1135** *Waiver*: HSD submitted a 1135 waiver and received CMS approval for the following:

- Suspending prior authorizations and extending existing authorizations;
- Suspending PASRR Level I and II screening assessments for 30 days;
- Extension of time to request fair hearing of up to 120 days;
- Enroll providers who are enrolled in another state's Medicaid program or who are enrolled in Medicare;
- Waive screening requirements (i.e., Fingerprints, site visits, etc.) to quickly enroll providers;
- Cease revalidation of currently enrolled providers;
- Payments to facilities for services provided in alternative settings;
- Temporarily allow non-emergency ambulance suppliers;
- Temporarily suspend payment sanctions; and
- Temporarily allow legally responsible individuals to provide PCS services to children under the EPSDT benefit.

Appendix Ks: HSD submitted five Appendix Ks and received CMS approval for the following:

#### 1915c Waivers (Medically Fragile, Mi Via, Developmental Disability, and Supports Waiver)

- Exceed service limitations (i.e., additional funds to purchase electronic devices for members, exceed provider limits in a controlled community residence and suspend prior authorization requirements for waiver services, which are related to or resulting from this emergency);
- Expand service settings (i.e., telephonic visits in lieu of face-to-face and provider trainings also done through telehealth mechanisms);
- Permit payment to family caregivers;

- Modify provider enrollment requirements (i.e., suspending fingerprinting and modifying training requirements);
- Reducing provider qualification requirements by allowing out-of-state providers to provide services, allowing for an extension of home health aide supervision with the ability to do the supervision remotely;
- Utilizing currently approved Level of Care Assessments to fulfil the annual requirement or completing new assessments telephonically;
- Modifying the person-centered care plan development process to allow for telephonic participation and electronic approval;
- Modifying incident reporting requirements;
- Temporarily increase payment rates; and
- Allow for payment for the purpose of supporting waiver participants in an acute care hospital or short-term institutional stay when necessary supports (including communication and intensive personal care) are not available in that setting, or when the individual requires those services for communication and behavioral stabilization, and such services are not covered in such settings.

#### 1115 Demonstration Waiver for Home Community Benefit Services (HCBS)

- Expand service settings (i.e., telephonic visits in lieu of face-face and provider trainings also done through telehealth mechanisms);
- Permit payment for services rendered by family caregivers or legally responsible individuals if not already permitted under the waiver;
- Modifying provider qualifications to allow provider enrollment or re- enrollment with modified risk screening elements;
- Modification to the process for level of care evaluations or re-evaluations;
- Modifying person-centered service plan development process to allow for telephonic participation and electronic approval;
- Modifying incident reporting requirements;
- Allow for payment for services; and
- Retainer payments for personal care services.

#### **Native American Collaboration**

The 2009 State-Tribal Collaboration Act codified an effective government-togovernment communication and collaboration between state and Tribal governments. The Act provides the framework for the state and Tribes to work together to develop successful programs and services to benefit New Mexico's Tribes, Pueblos, Nations and Native American citizens. Part of the Act requires HSD to train state employees in cultural competency and to submit an annual report to the Indian Affairs Department regarding HSD's implementation of the Act, as well as the programs and service HSD provides for Native Americans.

In 2020, with the onset of the COVID pandemic, HSD has worked extensively with the Tribes, Pueblos, and Nations in New Mexico to provide access to needed personal protective equipment, food, lodging, shelter, medical care, and transportation. The Medical Assistance Division and the Income Support Division have accessed federal waivers to increase Medicaid and SNAP benefits to New Mexico families.


The Native American Technical Advisory Committee (NATAC) was established in September 2012 as a subcommittee of the Medicaid Advisory Committee to give the Tribes, Pueblos, and Nations an opportunity to meet with the New Mexico Medicaid Director on a quarterly basis. The focus of these meetings is to continue discussion regarding Medicaid, including Centennial Care 2.0, Behavioral Health services, Income Support Division services, Tribal Notifications and the Indian Managed Care Entity (IMCE). HSD seeks the guidance from tribal leaders and their representative on how best to deliver services to their communities in this forum.


HSD continues to work with IHS/Tribal 638 facilities to develop the process for 100% Federal Medical Assistance Percentages (FMAP) for services received through an IHS/Tribal 638 facility and furnished to Medicaid eligible Native Americans. Efforts include 100% FMAP for IHS/tribal 638 Pharmacy Outpatient Prescription refill and signed Care Coordination Agreements (CCA) between:

- UNMH and Albuquerque Area Indian Health Service (AAIHS)
- Presbyterian Health Services and AIIHS
- UNMH and Navajo Area Indian Health Service

## Ratios of Federal to State Dollars Funding New Mexico Medicaid/CHIP Population, State Fiscal Year (SFY) 21







#### State Fiscal Year (SFY) 20 (revised) Medicaid/CHIP Expenditures for New Mexico, Pro-rated by County


#### State Fiscal Year (SFY) 21 Medicaid/CHIP Expenditures for New Mexico, Pro-rated by County










#### State Fiscal Year (SFY) 20-21 Incremental Medicaid/CHIP Expenditures Pro-rated by County

#### State Fiscal Year (SFY) 20-21 Medicaid/CHIP General Fund Need Change Pro-rated by County








U.S. Medicaid and CHIP Recipients (Comprehensive Coverage Only) as a Percentage of Population by State as of July 2020








### New Mexico Medicaid & CHIP Recipients as a Percentage of Population by County as of October 2020







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
New Mexico Percent of Native American Medicaid Enrollees that are Enrolled in a Medicaid Managed Care Organization (MCO) as of November 2020





## New Mexico Percent of Native American Medicaid Enrollees that are Enrolled in Medicaid Fee for Service (FFS) as of November 2020






### New Mexico Medicaid & CHIP Black/African American Recipients as a Percentage of Black/African American Population by County








## New Mexico Medicaid & CHIP Hispanic/Latino Recipients as a Percentage of Hispanic/Latino Population by






U.S. Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Participation as a Percentage of Population by State as of April 2020

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### New Mexico Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP) Recipients by County as of October 2020










## New Mexico Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program White Recipients as a Percentage of White Population by County as of October 2020 Percent of Population













## New Mexico Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) Program Recipients by County as of October















New Mexico Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Program Black/African American Recipients as a Percentage of Black/African American Population by County as of October 2020








# New Mexico Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Online Purchasing Transactions by County, May-December 2020









# New Mexico Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Online Purchasing Spending by County, May-December 2020






New Mexico Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Online Purchasing Spending as Percentage of Total Spending by County, May-December 2020


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

# New Mexico General Assistance Program Recipients as a Percentage of Population by County as of October








# New Mexico General Assistance Program White Recipients as a Percentage of White Population by County as of October 2020






New Mexico General Assistance Program Native American Recipients as a Percentage of Native American Population by County as of October 2020






# New Mexico General Assistance Program Black/African American Recipients as a Percentage of Black/African American Population by County as of October 2020

# New Mexico Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) Recipients by County October 2019 to September 2020








# New Mexico Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program Recipients as a Percentage of Population by County for October 2019 to September 2020















# New Mexico Average Number of School Children Issued Pandemic-EBT (P-EBT) by County, School Year 2019





## New Mexico Total Amount of Pandemic-EBT (P-EBT) Benefits by County, School Year 2019 and 2020



# New Mexico Child Support Dollars Collected Per Child Per Month Federal Fiscal Year 20 (FFY20)






## New Mexico Child Support Average Collections by County Federal Fiscal Year 20 (FFY20)




### New Mexico Human Services Department Employees by County as of October 2020


# Medicaid Behavioral Health Prescribing Providers by County as of October 2020



# Children Youth and Families Department (CYFD) Domestic Violence Survivors and Dependents Served by County, State Fiscal Year (SFY) 20











# Children Youth and Families Department (CYFD) Children Served in Foster Care by County, State Fiscal Year (SFY) 20

# **Child Support Modernization**

#### What is Child Support Modernization?

Child Support Modernization is the implementation of national best practices for New Mexico's child support program. Specifically, Modernization strengthens the child support enforcement program and updates current practices to increase regular, on-time payments to families, to increase the number of noncustodial parents supporting their children, and to improve program operations. These modernization practices will ensure more money is available to children in New Mexico.

#### **Financial Benefits to New Mexico**

The Child Support Enforcement Division launched a Modernization pilot in Rio Rancho, which increased the amount of child support collected per child by 8.2%. If all offices experience the same increase as the pilot office, the amount of child support collected per child would increase by almost \$11 per child per month.

#### **Benefits to New Mexicans**

Child support is an important source of income for families; HSD is collaborating with agency partners to provide New Mexican parents career opportunities. For example, the Supporting Training and Employing Parents (STEPup) program refers underemployed or unemployed parents to the NM Department of Workforce Solutions for job application assistance and employment. Since it March 2019 launch, 169 parents have participated in the program and 85 parents (50%) began paying child support while 49 (29%) parents obtained employment.

#### **Frequently Asked Questions**

# Q. Will shifting the focus from legal enforcement to employment let non-paying child support parents off the hook?

**A.** No, work requirements remain for child support orders that if not complied with will lead to further legal enforcement.


# Q. Will Child Support Modernization reduce the amount of child support I currently receive?

**A.** Under the federal modernization regulations, HSD is required to use the actual income of both parties to calculate support obligations. This means that staff cannot impute income that may not actually exist. Although this may reduce the monthly support amount in a court order, it means the non-custodial parent is more likely to regularly pay and comply with the order as the support amount is based on an actual income.



# **Primary Care Graduate Medical Education Expansion**

#### What is Primary Care Graduate Medical Education Expansion?

HSD, through its Graduate Medical Education (GME) Expansion Program, funds new and expanding primary care GME programs and provides technical assistance to the program network. GME is the physician training period after medical school and before independent practice; and research demonstrates 55% of medical residents will stay within 100 miles of their residency program. Building on the <u>2019 GME Expansion in</u> <u>NM Five-Year Strategic Plan</u>, it is anticipated primary care programs will grow from 8 to 13 (63% increase) by 2025.

#### **Financial Benefits to New Mexicans**

- Each physician supports \$3,166,901 in output, an average of 17.07 jobs, ~\$1.4 million in total wages and benefits, and \$126,000 in state and local tax revenues.
- Primary care workforce propels growth in other aspects of the healthcare system, generating \$784,752 in billed charges for a hospital and \$241,276 in professional fees for specialty consultants.

#### **Benefits to New Mexicans**

- Positive impact on population health because individuals with a primary care physician are healthier, regardless of health status or demographics
- Bridge the gap in physician shortages, which exist across all specialties. NM has the oldest physician population, a shortage of providers particularly in rural and frontier communities, and an on-going need for 100 –200 primary care physicians and a similar number of psychiatrists.


#### Q. Have any primary care GME programs received funding for expansion support?

**A.** Yes, in FY20 three programs were selected to receive funding, totaling \$1,000,035:

- Burrell College of Osteopathic Medicine (Las Cruces) to add a total of 12 new Family Medicine residency positions. Anticipated date of arrival of first resident: Summer 2021.
- Memorial Medical Center (Las Cruces) to add a total of 12 new General Psychiatry residency positions. Anticipated date of arrival of first resident: Summer 2022.
- Rehoboth McKinley Christian Health Care Services (Gallup) to add a total of 12 new General Psychiatry residency positions. Anticipated date of arrival of first resident: Summer 2024.

#### Q. What is NM doing to recruit and retain primary care residents from New Mexico?

**A.** As primary care GME programs expand, it is important that a statewide academic network be established to provide staff and financial support to community-based programs. The NM Primary Care Training Consortium is working with the State to provide technical assistance to programs related to student and faculty recruitment and retention, as well as curriculum development. HSD is prioritizing funding programs that commit to actively placing residents in New Mexico upon program competition.




# NM Distribution of First-Year Primary Care Residents by Specialty, 2019-20 & 2020-21 Years (%)

# HHS 2020

#### What is the HHS 2020?

HHS 2020 is an initiative that contains multiple projects designed to achieve the vision to create a highly responsive and effective health and human services system to improve the health and well-being of all New Mexicans. The Medicaid Management Information System Replacement (MMISR) project, funded with a combination of federal and state funds, provides the technical foundation. MMISR removes barriers to sharing information across public-facing departments (the "enterprise") and improves the quality of service for those receiving public assistance, their health care providers, and health and human services workers.

#### **Financial Benefits to New Mexico**

The federal government is paying for 90% of the project. For every dollar spent by New Mexico, an additional \$9 comes from the federal government.

#### **Benefits to New Mexicans**

- "One-stop shop" whether online, on the phone, or in an office, the public will have a single point of contact to access resources and services for any health and human services agency or program.
- Improved efficiency for providers through more streamlined approval, contract, and payment processes.
- Removal of silos around information about customers via a "unified portal," providing workers across health and human services departments a single resource.
- Improved population health and well-being by moving from a system centered around discrete transactions to one that holistically addresses an individual's needs

#### Frequently Asked Questions

#### Q. What benefit does this project have to policy makers?

**A.** MMISR increases access to data for multiple stakeholders and allows for a 360degree view of members, providers, and other entities. It will enable data-driven decision making and provide automated dashboards of key information. Oversight of managed care performance and ability to forecast Medicaid expenditures also will be provided.

#### Q. What other agencies are participating in the HHS 2020 MMISR project?

**A.** In addition to HSD, the sister health agencies—Aging and Long Term Services Department; Children, Youth, and Families Department; Department of Health; Early Childhood Education and Care Department—are all participating in the MMISR project.

#### CUSTOMER


A New Mexico resident with a question about her family's TANF benefits calls the number for the Consolidated Customer Service Center. Once she provides her information, the agent realizes that her issue overlaps another program administered by a different department — and answers her question related to that program without transferring the call.

#### COMMUNITY PARTNER

A case worker who travels around northeastern New Mexico is preparing to help a client with an application late at night. He has a question about a program and uses the chat function at the Consolidated Customer Service **Center** to get an immediate answer, even though it's after business hours.



#### PROVIDER

A billing specialist at a hospital in Roswell has a question about how to process some claims she needs to submit. She's able to call one phone number at the **Consolidated Customer Service Center** to get answers, even though the claims involve several different state programs and departments.

#### **EMPLOYEE**

An employee at CSED who handles inquiries often used to have to ask customers to call another number at another department. Because of the automated functions of the Consolidated Customer Service Center, they often don't even need to speak to her, but when they do, she handles all their questions at one time with access to all programs.



### **HSD IT Investments**

#### What are the HSD IT investments?

HSD makes IT investments in three critical areas:

- 1. IT infrastructure;
- 2. IT applications; and,
- 3. New projects to deliver new capabilities and services to the department's customers and workforce.

Although other parts of HSD are cutting budgets, leadership is not reducing its investment in IT for FY 2022. For FY 2022, HSD has prioritized continued investment in the ASPEN integrated eligibility system to improve delivery of services to New Mexicans at the same level as FY 2021.

#### **Financial Benefits to New Mexico**

Investments in ASPEN lower operating costs for HSD. An example of this return on investment is the implementation of real time eligibility for Medicaid applications. Medicaid real time eligibility resulted in 29,673 applications being processed without worker action from January 1, 2020 through August 2, 2020.

Utilizing the average time of data entry for processing of Medicaid applications, Medicaid real time eligibility saved an estimated 41,794 hours of staff time during the same period. This savings equates to \$2,032,864 and is equivalent to 38 staff positions.

#### **Benefits to New Mexicans**

Investments in the ASPEN system provide direct support to New Mexicans during the COVID-19 pandemic. For example, current investments resulted in HSD issuing \$124,442,274 of supplemental SNAP benefits for 182,316 SNAP households. Pandemic Electronic Benefits totaled \$151,448,366, supporting 285,471 children.

#### **Frequently Asked Questions**

#### Q. What does IT cost per customer served by HSD's programs in New Mexico?

**A.** The total cost per customer served by HSD is about \$44 (estimated by dividing the total amount of the ITD's operating budget by the number of customers served by HSD in a given state fiscal year).

#### Q. For every dollar spent on IT, how much is covered by federal funds?


**A.** HSD receives a federal match for most IT investments the Department makes. For every dollar spent within the IT operating budget, \$0.665 is covered by federal funds. Federal match varies based on the program or system though. For example, the ASPEN system has a federal match rate of 67.2%.

#### Q. Why are IT investments needed?

**A.** IT Investments support an increased demand for services and enables increased enrollment in HSD's programs. From January 2020-November 2020, HSD approved 114,906 new SNAP applications and 75,835 new Medicaid applications. Since March 1, 2020, the department has seen a 20% increase in the number of people accessing the department's online YES NM portal to apply for benefits and services. Continued and increased investment in IT systems support this increased demand.

# New Mexico Medicaid Program Budget

#### What is the New Mexico Medicaid Program Budget?

Medicaid is a jointly-administered federal and state health insurance program for eligible lower-income individuals and certain people with disabilities. The projected FY22 budget for NM Medicaid is \$7.2 billion based on data through September 2020. Factors that increase Medicaid program costs include:

- Increased Medicaid and Children Health Insurance Program (CHIP) enrollment:
  - Baseline projection assumes Federal Government ends Public Health Emergency (PHE) January 2021. Section 6008 of the Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA) requires that the State follows a 'maintenance of effort' (MOE) to sustain coverage to qualified enrollees through the duration of the PHE. Thereafter, a gradual disenrollment is expected.
  - Alternatively, if the PHE remains through March 2021, enrollment is projected to surpass 900,000 individuals in quarter one of CY 2021. The Medicaid-CHIP enrollment is projected to remain above 918,000 members through at least June 2021. If the PHE continues into FY 2022, then the FY 2022 budget would exceed the baseline projection of \$7.2 billion. The incremental expenditures from following the PHE order would be compensated by further extensions of the 6.2% increased FMAP, posing no additional fiscal risk to the General Fund.
- Increased medical service unit costs and increased utilization of services in the wake of the COVID-19 public health emergency.
- Gradual disenrollment resulting from removal of MOE requirements.
- Modest economic recovery from PHE, resulting in some disenrollment.
- Legislature enabled changes to align provider rates with costs after years of inadequate payment.

Due to the PHE, NM receives a 6.2% increased federal medical assistance percentage (FMAP), as authorized by the FFCRA (effective January 1, 2020). For the State to receive the 6.2% point increased FMAP through the duration of the PHE, the State must follow the MOE requirements in the FFCRA. The increased FMAP brought in an estimated \$138.6 million additional federal dollars to NM in FY 2020 (two quarters) and a projected \$217.5 million in FY 2021 (three quarters). The additional federal funds correspond to a higher proportion of Medicaid-CHIP expenditures covered by federal dollars in FY 2021 relative to FY 2022 (shown on figure below). If the Federal Government declares the end of the PHE on January 21, 2021 then the increased FMAP would expire at the end of March 2021. Based on the current PHE order, the projected budget of \$7.2 billion for FY 2022 will have a General Fund shortfall of \$162 million without an increase in the FMAP.

#### **Financial Benefits to New Mexico**

- Medicaid reduces uncompensated care costs experienced by healthcare providers.
- Medicaid is a primary source of revenue to healthcare providers in NM.
- Taxes and assessments paid through Medicaid provide revenues to:
  - New Mexico's health insurance exchange;
  - New Mexico's high-risk insurance pool; and,
  - Access-to-care through programs such as PACE and Project ECHO.

#### **Benefits to New Mexicans**

The Medicaid program currently provides coverage to 43% of the State's population and 58% of children in NM. Consequently, the Medicaid program plays a critical role in reducing out-of-pocket medical costs across households, and moderating uncompensated care costs experienced by healthcare providers.

# New Mexico Medicaid Program Budget

#### **Frequently Asked Questions**

**Q. What are the projected enrollment trends in the Medicaid-CHIP program? A.** As of October 2020, the total Medicaid-CHIP enrollment is 889,886, of which 373,190 are children (individuals under 21 years old), and 87,711 receive partial benefits. Full benefit individuals are required to enroll in managed care, except Native Americans who can opt-in; individuals needing long term care services and support must enroll in managed care.

The average monthly managed care enrollment is 741,436 members in FY 2021 and projected to be 713,583 in FY 2022, a decrease of 3.8% from FY 2021. The projected enrollments by program in FY 2022 are 422,927 members in the Physical Health program (2.6% below FY 2021); 239,451 members in the Other Adult Group Physical Health program (6.7% below FY 2021); and 51,204 members in the Long Term Services and Supports (LTSS) program (1.6% above FY 2021). All managed care members are enrolled in the Behavioral Health program. Despite the downward enrollment trend from FY 2021 to FY 2022, the projected enrollment for June 2022 remains 32,269 members above the March 2020 level of 680,237.

#### Q. How has the COVID-19 pandemic impacted the Medicaid and CHIP programs?

**A.** The COVID-19 pandemic disrupted the delivery of health care services throughout New Mexico's healthcare system. In accordance with federal guidelines, HSD implemented various initiatives focusing on the effects of COVID-19, such as delaying non-critical medical care. The Medicaid and CHIP programs have been impacted in the following ways:

- Increased medical expenses associated with acute and long-term care of Medicaid populations. Specifically, additional personal protective equipment needs, additional cleaning and protection needs, and significant staffing challenges.
- Testing, treatment, and vaccine administration are unanticipated expenses significantly impacting the Medicaid budget.
- Delayed costs from pent-up demand as a result of necessary public health orders and fear of exposure.
- Increased unemployment has resulted in significant Medicaid enrollment. Medicaid enrollment typically grows at a rate of .1% per month but since April 2020 has grown on average by 1.5% per month.

The PHE along with the MOE contributed to a high rate of enrollment growth in Medicaid between March 2020 and March 2021. The Pre and Post COVID Enrollment Projections Figure (below) illustrates the Medicaid-CHIP enrollment growth from 837,353 in March 2020 to 901,005 by November 2020, an addition of 65,000 low-income children and adults. Gradual reductions in enrollment during CY 2021 are contingent on the expiration of the PHE and improvement in economic conditions.

If the PHE expires on January 21, 2021 the MOE will no longer be in effect. Consequently, a gradual enrollment decline is projected to begin in April 2021, involving individuals who fail to recertify their eligibility for Medicaid coverage. Loses in Medicaid coverage are expected to be offset by the gradual recovery of employer-based coverage under improved economic conditions. However, if the PHE persists beyond March 2021, then the projected enrollment level of 918,000 (March, 2021) will be sustained through FY 2022.

# Telehealth

#### What is telehealth?

Telehealth refers to healthcare services that are delivered remotely, like virtual doctor's visits or pharmacy information. Throughout NM telehealth is growing in popularity – with beneficiaries accessing physical and behavioral healthcare services using telecommunications technologies.

Telehealth can serve as a substitute for in-person healthcare, avoiding inconveniences and costs in receiving care. Telehealth can also act as a complement to in-person healthcare, improving healthcare outcomes. Accordingly, telehealth is an essential resource in the NM Medicaid program, providing a valuable option in the delivery of care.

Telehealth has been a critical component of the State's response during the COVID-19 pandemic. In mid-March, HSD authorized billing for expanded telehealth, allowing beneficiaries to safely access many physical health services and most behavioral health services, thus supporting providers around the state in maintaining service delivery.

#### **General Fund and Federal Fund**

The General and Federal funding of telehealth services applies the same federal matching formulas as in-person service delivery. The financial implications for the Medicaid program are under study, as access to these services expands across the Medicaid-covered provider network.

#### **Financial Benefits to New Mexico**

Financial benefits from telehealth accrue to service providers and individuals seeking services. Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) also benefit from network economies in delivering services to their members. While the monetary value to the NM Medicaid program is under study, national studies tend to find cost-savings from telehealth over a non-telehealth alternative. Specifically, Wade et al. (2010) reviewed economic literature covering 36 studies, finding cost-savings from telehealth in 22 studies compared to cost-increases in 11 studies, and mixed results in the 3 remaining studies. Benefits from timely healthcare and improved well-being are most widely reported in a rural-outpatient setting.

#### **Benefits to New Mexicans**

This year the COVID-19 pandemic clarified the value of telemedicine options, motivating the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) to expand virtual services (Brandon, 2020). Telehealth options were promptly implemented by New Mexico's Medicaid program, which reimbursed providers for delivery of remote services.

Telehealth appears to bring positive outcomes for both behavioral health providers and their clients. Providers report fewer appointment no-shows and cancellations, and potentially better outcomes as many clients appear more relaxed and able to engage in therapy when they are in their own homes. Clients avoided the cost and inconvenience of driving potentially long distances, and providers worked safely from home or scaled-down office settings.

#### Frequently Asked Questions

#### Q. What Services are well-suited for telehealth?

**A.** Visits that don't require in person examinations or diagnostic testing can easily be transitioned to telemedicine. Follow-up visits, new patient visits that don't require detailed physical exams or diagnostic tests, and behavioral health visits are a few examples of well-suited services.

#### Q. Is telehealth suitable in providing Behavioral Health services?


**A**. Depending on a client's unique circumstances, many behavioral health services are wellsuited for telehealth. A wide range of individual, family, and group therapies – including those focusing on substance abuse disorder – can be successfully delivered via telehealth. Telehealth visits can often support services involving an initial or periodic physical face-to-face examination.

#### Q. How has telehealth helped maintain healthcare services during the COVID-19 pandemic?

**A.** A preliminary review examined the change in telehealth between the first and second quarters of calendar year 2020. This comparison is illustrated in Figures 1 and 2 below. Based on preliminary data, HSD observed an increase of 61,492 telehealth claims, reflecting a 300% increase. Synchronously, the average volume of total healthcare claims dropped 275,000 per month. Consequently, telehealth was instrumental in maintaining service delivery.



# HSD Department Performance SCORE CARD Scorecard

## SECTION 6

This section showcases the new, online and publicly-accessible Department Performance Scorecard organized by the HSD strategic goals. Included are graphs and descriptions of all 31 measures.

## **Summary of Scorecard**

HSD's programs serve more than 1 million New Mexicans. With a Fiscal Year 2021 budget of \$7,560,018,800, the department makes budgetary and policy decisions that have long-term effects on both state spending and its customers. As a result, HSD is deeply committed to incorporating principles of evidence-based governance, using data to drive decision making to achieve optimal results aligned to strategic priorities. As stewards of New Mexicans' tax dollars, HSD staff and leaders have a responsibility to use data in the delivery and monitoring of high-quality health and human services programs, and to be transparent about (and held accountable to) its performance.

The HSD Performance Scorecard is a strategic management tool used to identify and improve various internal business functions and their resulting outcomes, and provide feedback to key stakeholders, including HSD customers and the public. It is designed to help answer the most common questions New Mexicans may have about the Human Services Department. Individuals can use the Scorecard to choose a Medicaid Managed Care Organization that best meets their needs, or to determine how quickly they can apply for and get benefits via several different routes. Some of the metrics show opportunities for improvement; and, ultimately, the Scorecard shows what HSD is doing and how well the department is performing.

The <u>Pew Foundation</u> has published extensive data on evidence-based policy making, outlining five key components:

- 1. <u>Program assessment</u>: review public programs to understand their evidence base.
- 2. <u>Budget development</u>: use evidence of program effectiveness in budget processes to make more informed investment choices.
- 3. <u>Implementation oversight</u>: support effective implementation to ensure the benefits of evidence-based programs are achieved.
- 4. <u>Outcome monitoring</u>: measure and report outcome data to determine whether programs or priorities are achieving desired results.
- 5. <u>Targeted evaluation</u>: support impact evaluations of select public programs to learn what works.

The HSD Performance Scorecard is designed to:

- Promote greater intra-departmental communication and accountability;
- Maintain strategic focus;
- Determine what is critical to measure;
- Support the department in implementing changes and measuring outcomes; and,
- Tell HSD's story accurately, consistently.

With a total of 31 measures, the Scorecard categorizes measures among the four goals outlined in the <u>HSD Strategic Plan</u>.

- 1. Improve the value and range of services we provide to ensure that every qualified New Mexican receives timely and accurate benefits.
- 2. Create effective, transparent communication to enhance the public trust.
- 3. Successfully implement technology to give customers and staff the best and most convenient access to services and information.
- 4. Promote an environment of mutual respect, trust and open communication to grow and reach our professional goals.

Each measure includes the following:

- Graph with measure name, legend, description of x and y axes, and data
- Description of the measure
- Reporting frequency (e.g. monthly, quarterly, annually)
- Numerator
- Denominator
- Target, if applicable
- Data source
- Comments

Pursuant to the Accountability in Government Act (AGA), quarterly reports are required of key state agencies (such as the Human Services Department), including performance measures and targets approved for each fiscal year by the Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) in consultation with the Legislative Finance Committee (LFC). Although many measures are included in both the Scorecard and the AGA quarterly reports, HSD developed a Department Performance Scorecard because it offers more flexibility and is an opportunity to showcase many diverse measures that tie directly to its <u>Strategic Plan</u>. Whereas LFC measures may be consistent across administrations, the Scorecard reflects the vision of the current administration and uses the most accurate and up-to-date methodology for data collection and reporting.








# Goal 2: As a member of the public, how many times could I read media stories about HSD with positive or neutral sentiments?




# Goal 3: As a staff member, how long am I waiting for the eligibility system to respond to the final determination steps?






