Human Services Department Income Support Division Community Services Block Grant (CSB G) Fact Sheet

#### 1. What is the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG)?

The Community Services Block Grant is a block grant from U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. CSBG provides a flexible funding source to HSD for local communities through a network of community action agencies for the reduction of poverty.



#### **▶** Required Allocation of Funds

- o 5% Discretionary Spending


# ► Four Year Sole Source Professional Services Contracts (amended each year)

- A base allocation of \$50,000 to each CAA for regular CSBG funding.
- \$79,515 to HELP NM for state-wide seasonal and migrant farm workers services.
- Remainder apportioned by county poverty census data to CAAs.

### 3. Program Elements

#### **▶** Services

- 1. Examples of CAA Services Include:
  - o Employment OJT, work experience, job placement, counseling, self-employment
  - Education Head Start, Pre-K, before and after school programs, vocational training, post secondary, GED, pre-employment certification training, literacy, school supplies
  - o Emergency Services rental/mortgage assistance, utility assistance, emergency medical assistance, food vouchers and/or boxes, disaster relief, information and referral
  - Nutrition Food Bank, food pantries, food boxes, children and senior meals, summer food program, child back-pack program, and delivery of food to home bound seniors and disabled individuals
  - o Income Management Free tax preparation services, Individual Development Account (IDA), financial counseling and financial literacy classes
  - o Housing Rehabilitation and weatherization, and construction of new homes
  - Health Initiatives prescription assistance, Adult Day Services, Covering Kids program, and Head Start—children immunization, medical and dental check-ups information and referral
  - Build Partnerships To expand resources and opportunities for low-income individuals and families
  - Promote Self-Sufficiency Financial counseling and budgeting, childcare services, employment and training services, parenting classes

#### 2. FFY 2010 Program Outcomes Excerpts

- Funds Leveraged \$48,096,961 of federal, state, local and private funding using CSBG funding
- o Families Served -
  - Total unduplicated number of families about whom one or more demographic characteristics were obtained: 31,012
  - Total unduplicated number of families about whom no demographic characteristics were obtained: 46,353
- o 5 CAAs offered tax preparation assistance
  - 9,989 participants were served
  - 9,867 participants qualified for tax credits
  - \$4,102380 in federal and state tax credits realized
- 5 CAAs provided emergency food assistance
  - 52,584 individuals received emergency food
- o 5 CAAs reported
  - 8,618 individuals received emergency utility assistance
- o 6 CAAs reported
  - 14,447 children received adequate nutrition to improve health and physical development
  - 3,521 children enrolled in pre-school activities to develop school readiness skills

#### 4. Program Elements—CSBG American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA)

- ► HSD received \$5,695,092 in CSBG ARRA funding from April 14, 2009 through September 30, 2010. The CAAs received 99% of the CSBG ARRA funds. HSD received 1% for benefits enrollment and coordination of activities. All CSBG ARRA funds were expended. Services provided included the following:
  - o 554 unemployed individuals obtained a job.
  - o 602 individuals completed course work or received certifications required for specific jobs.
  - o 1618 individuals received ongoing food assistance.

- o 529 individuals obtained safe and affordable housing.
- o 400 individual obtained access to reliable transportation, or obtained a Driver's license.
- o 413 jobs were created or saved from elimination.
- o 236 child care or child development placements were created or saved from elimination.
- o 1609 senior citizens received services enabling them to maintain independent living.
- o 8731 individual received one or more of the following emergency services: food, fuel/utility payments, rent/mortgage assistance.
- o 118 children participated in preschool activities to develop school readiness skills.
- o 33.078 food boxes were distributed.

## 5. CSBG Funding Future

- ► FFY 2012 funding will be reduced by .23%
- ► FFY 2012 Pueblo of Zuni awarded tribal CSBG funding. The State allocation will be reduced due to this new allocation of funds to the Pueblo.
