Treatment of Medical Loss Rebates (MLR)

The Medical Loss Rebate (MLR) is known as the 80/20 Rule under the Mordable Care Act (ACA). The 80/20 rule is a reimbursement from insurance carrier. This rebate is reimbursed to consumers if less than 80% of the premium are point on medical care, this percentage may be higher for larger groups markets. The remaining 20% of premiums will go towards administrative costs for insurance carriers. <u>Under ACA</u> insurance companies must pay impacted bouseholds by august 1, of each year.

How will MLR impact SNAP and TANE?

For SNAP & TANF purposes are repaired are considered non-recurring lump-sum payments as the rebails may or may not be received by households each year. Non-recurring lump stap payments are excluded from income, including rebates per regulation at 8.135.50..9 (D) (9) and 8.106.510.9 (B) (5) NMAC.

If a household receives the rebate as a check or directly in their bank accounts, how do we treat this payment?

For SNAP, the e rebates are counted as a resource in the month received and excluded a incomper regulation at 8.139.510.9 (B) (a-d) NMAC.

For TANE, these rebates shall be considered a resource in the month received. The countable value is considered a liquid resource per regulation at 8.102.510.9 (B) (5) NMAC.

If rebates are in the form of a reduction from premiums or non-payment form it should not be counted as a resource because it is accessible to the participant per regulation at 8.139.510.10 (A) (8) and 8.102.520.8 (G) NMAC.
