The key factor to consider whan determining whether a SNAP applicant/recipient is considered enrolled in an institution of gas acation NMAC 8.139.400.11 A (2) is whether a high school diploma, GED, or some divalent certificate is required to be enrolled in the program. To determine if an individual is a eligible or ineligible student rests solely on whether the program he/she is enrolled requires a highs school diploma, GED, or other equivalency certificate to enroll in the program. If the answer is yes, the person is considered a student enrolled in an institution of higher education. If the answer is no, the person is not considered a student.

- \*Attached is a table to better define the types of programs where SNAP Applicants are considered enrolled and not enrolled.
- \*To verify student status the Financial Aid and Budget Verification for Students, Form FSP 420 has been revised to include a section to be completed by the educational institution. This form outlines the type of program the student is enrolled in, whether or not it requires a diploma, and if it is part of the regular curriculum. This form shall be used by the admissions office at the school to verify student status whenever enrollment in a higher education program is questionable or unknown.
